Y2 theatre trip



Human Rights Day

Our Rights Champions talked to the whole school about the United Nations Rights of the Child and also shared some key terminology:

- 2. Duty bearers those are the adults responsible for making sure your rights are protected.

Duty bearers include parents, grandparents, teachers, teaching assistants, police officers, doctors etc.







Y5 and the Christmas Food Bank

This term Year 5's writing unit has focused on the book 'The Great Food Bank Heist' by Onjali Q. Raúf. As well as developing their narrative writing skills, children have also been learning about persuasive devices, creating persuasive texts to encourage people to support the food bank. Earlier in the term, Year 5 had a visit from a representative from the local food bank and have since been working with Mrs Wolton to encourage as many people from our school community to make donations to the food bank to support this important cause over the Christmas period.

School Council

This term, our School Councillors from Year 3 - Year 6 launched anti-bullying week via whole school assembly. The councillors were incredible, and many had spent time over the half term break looking over their lines!



Over the next few weeks, School Councillors from Years 3-5 will be forming a judging panel for The Royal Society's Young People's Book Prize. Our judging panel will read 6 STEM books, giving their feedback on each before submitting their final recommendation to The Royal Society.

- Year 1 have performed to children across the school and also to families.
- Year 2 performed in Holy Trinity church to families.



Early Years

Acorns: The Acorns children have had a busy term. We started Forest Fun this term and the children have thoroughly enjoyed learning in the forest environment as well as enjoying the hot chocolate! We welcomed a pair of cheeky elves to Acorns, which the children named Elfie and Jingle. Elfie and Jingle brought plenty of Christmas magic to Acorns while we decorated our trees and made crowns to wear for our Christmas songs. This term's weather has given us many opportunities to explore ice and snow, and although we had to make our own snow, there was plenty of ice! This enabled us to complete a range of activities, including activities on how to break the ice to rescue the arctic animals which were trapped inside, which we did by safely using our hammers to break the ice and set the animals free!

Reception: This term, Reception have been learning about 'Celebrations'. We have enjoyed looking at photos of events which families celebrate at home. We have also focused specifically on the Hindu festival of Diwali and the Christian festival of Christmas. We have read stories, listened to music, made crafts and explored dancing and music linked with both festivals. We visited the local church and learnt about what Christians might do to celebrate Christmas in church. We have also explored the ways in which people in the UK celebrate Christmas that aren't specifically Christian e.g. decorating Christmas trees, wrapping and giving presents, writing and giving Christmas cards and enjoying Christmas stories and music. The children have worked hard to learn the songs for our Christmas performance and they were incredibly brave and resilient when they got up in front of lots of adults to sing. We are very proud of them!

Key Stage 1

<u>Year 1:</u> The children have had a fantastic and action-packed term! After a visit from Frank the Elf, they wrote letters back to the elves, sharing how they have been demonstrating the school values. We're keeping our fingers crossed for a reply from the big man himself – Father Christmas!

The role-play shed was transformed into a Christmas post office, where the children eagerly put their new letter-writing skills to the test. It has been a hive of activity!

The children have worked incredibly hard since the start of term to put on an AMAZING Christmas performance. We hope you enjoyed watching it as much as we enjoyed performing it! In maths, we've been learning to add and subtract, and we've just explored 2D and 3D shapes. In art, the children have been experimenting with layering and overlapping techniques. Using natural materials, they built stunning sculptures inspired by the work of Andy Goldsworthy.

What an incredible term it has been! We wish you all a wonderful Christmas and a very Happy New Year.

<u>Year 2:</u> In school, we've been diving into the beautiful book Journey by Aaron Becker. This wordless story has inspired us to use our imaginations, write letters, and create our own exciting adventures. It's been lovely to see the children exploring their creativity and coming up with fantastic ideas.

Our trip to the Watermill Theatre to see Pinocchio was absolutely magical! The show was full of amazing performances and wonderful storytelling, bringing the classic tale to life in such a fun and engaging way. The children showed our Charlton values so excellently, and were a pleasure to take out.

As we head into the holiday season, we'd like to wish all our families a joyful and peaceful Christmas break. We hope you enjoy special moments together and have a relaxing, happy time. See you in the new year!

Key Stage 2

Year 3: It's been another great term in Year 3! In English, the children have been writing stories and letters based on 'The Adventures of the Dish and the Spoon', focusing on the use of different sentence structures and conjunctions. They've done a brilliant job! Both classes have been persevering with addition and subtraction in Maths, learning to use the formal column method and how to represent exchanges. Next up, multiplication and division! The children have enjoyed our unit on light in Science. A highlight for all was using the UV beads to see the effect of UV light! We were so proud of the children's Christmas singing in the church - they put in lots of practice and we think they were brilliant!

<u>Year 4:</u> Year 4 have had a very busy term! We have loved our adventures in the forest with Miss Biles, and have learnt how to tie various knots, built dens, maintained the forest and made fires.

In science, we began our 'teeth and digestion' unit by being teeth detectives and exploring real animal skulls to see if the shape of the teeth could tell us about the animals' diet. We then went on to explore the human digestive system with Weetabix, bananas and tights, acting as the intestines! In Design & Technology, the children have been busy designing their own wrap which they will make and eat in a celebration Classroom Cafe event. This term, we have even managed to fit in a trip to the Catholic Church to explore Mary's role in the Christmas narrative.

We have had a fantastic term and have been really proud of how hard the children have worked. Well done Year 4!

Year 5: Year 5 have had an exciting term. In English, the children have explored the critical role food banks play in supporting our community. They used their persuasive writing skills to create powerful adverts, encouraging people to donate and make a difference—a project that fostered empathy and real-world awareness. PE has been a highlight, with the children developing their gymnastic skills, showcasing strength and agility. In art, the children were inspired by the works of Bob Pattison. They learned about his unique approach to layering composition and created their own stunning pieces, experimenting with tone, shade and tint to produce vibrant artwork that they were proud to share. Geography lessons took the class on a journey around the world. They explored how countries are connected through trade and why these links are vital for economies and communities. This global perspective sparked curiosity and a deeper understanding of the world around them. The children have been budding physicists carrying out hands-on investigations to explore the forces impacting our everyday lives. From designing and testing parachutes to understand air resistance, to experimenting with friction and gravity, the classroom has been buzzing with discovery and excitement.

Year 6: This term got off to a really exciting start when the children attended a talk as part of the Wantage Literary Festival from the author Iszi Laurence! She was really engaging and the children loved it, so much so that Mrs Campbell got lots of requests to get her books for the library! This term has also seen all the children complete their swimming lessons at the Leisure Centre, where they have all tried really hard to improve their swimming level and represented Charlton impeccably. You may also have noticed that the children have bought home their amazing door stops, the outcome of their DT project. They have worked really hard and showed excellent perseverance and imagination in creating these. In English, with a link to our History work on World War 2, the children have been reading Letters from a Lighthouse. They have produced some factual and well thought out persuasive letters, from the perspective of the government encouraging people to evacuate their children to the countryside.

Children's sickness and diarrhoea

From time to time, children are sick either at home or at school. Unfortunately, it is not possible to distinguish between the causes, and therefore it is essential that the same rule of exclusion applies in all cases of vomiting or diarrhoea.

Diarrhoea and/or vomiting commonly affects children and staff and can be caused by a number of different germs, including viruses, parasites and bacteria. Infections can be easily spread from person to person (by unwashed hands), especially in children. In general, it is recommended that any child with diarrhoea and/or vomiting symptoms must stay away from school or early years setting until they have been free of symptoms for 48 hours (the '48 hour rule') and feel well. Personal hygiene whilst ill must be very strict.

If your child is sick at school, we will ask you or your emergency contact to take your child home. They should not return for 48 hours to the school premises. We appreciate that this is inconvenient in many cases, and your child may not appear to be ill, but you will appreciate that we do this in all cases, and it should reduce the risk of infection for all children in school.


